EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Capital City Committee (CCC) is an intergovernmental body established under the *City of Adelaide Act 1998* whose primary function is to enhance and promote the development of the city of Adelaide as the capital city of South Australia.

The City of Adelaide Act 1998 requires that the CCC prepare an Annual Report each year on the operations of the Committee for the financial year ending the preceding 30 June. Once prepared, the Annual Report (**Attachment A**) is required to be tabled in State Parliament and presented to the Council to note. The Capital City Committee Annual Report 2021-22 was tabled in State Parliament on 30 May 2023.

This report additionally provides an update on Capital City Committee membership, meetings and activities.

Consideration in confidence is sought because this report includes details of agendas and deliberations that occur in confidence in order to enable strategic discussions between the State Government and Council, the disclosure of which could prejudice the position of State Government and/or Council.

Grounds

 - (i) would divulge information provided on a confidential basis by or to a Minister of the Crown, or another public authority or official (not being an employee of the council, or a person engaged by the council); and
 - (ii) would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest

Basis

The disclosure of information in this report would breach 'Cabinet in confidence' information presented to the Capital City Committee (the CCC) established under the *City of Adelaide Act 1998* which has provided for a State/Capital City inter-governmental forum (the CCC) to operate and the associated duty of confidence and duty as a member of the inter-governmental forum.

Public Interest

The Committee is satisfied that the principle that the meeting be conducted in a place open to the public has been outweighed in the circumstances because the disclosure of this information would divulge information provided on a confidential basis and could undermine the CCC operations and prejudice the position of the State Government and/or Council in relation to current/future proposals prior to State Government and/or City of Adelaide evaluation and deliberation.

7 CCC Budget and Development Program

7.1 The CCC is funded by both the State Government (DPC) and the City of Adelaide on a 50/50 cost share basis totalling approximately \$700,000 per annum. This covers staffing costs for the Secretariat and allows for funding of some projects.

7.2 Under the Terms of Reference for the CCC and Executive group, expenditure from the CCC budget will have regard to the strategic priorities and discussions of the Committee and Executive Group.

7.3 At its meeting on 19 April 2023 the CCC agreed the following priority areas as its Development Program (noting that additional discrete projects can be added by the CCC during the year):

Priority Area	Description and identified projects
City Residential Growth	There is a shared commitment by both the State Government and City of Adelaide to support residential growth in the city.
City Experience	City experience is about intensifying and promoting the city experience, including through activations, events, placemaking and arts and culture which is key to draw workers, visitors and future residents to the city.
City Precincts	This is a watching brief on major developments and precincts of strategic importance to the city.
Homelessness	This is an ongoing key city issue. The CCC has in the past made a contribution to the annual Don Dunstan Foundation's Homelessness Conference.

7.4 After taking into account salaries and previously committed expenditure in the 2022-23 year and the recent return of unspent funds under wellbeing-related grant agreements, there is approximately \$550,000 available for expenditure on CCC related projects in the 2022-23 financial year.

- 7.5 Any unspent funds in 2022-23 will be the subject of Budget carryover processes of the Department of Treasury and Finance (unspent monies in previous years have generally been carried over, particularly given the co-contribution nature of CCC funding).
- 7.6 From 2023-24, there is approximately \$330,000 per annum (indexed) available for expenditure.
- 7.7 The CCC will discuss potential expenditure proposals at its next meeting, on 21 June.
- 7.8 The table below outlines the funding proposals the City of Adelaide has successfully applied for through the CCC Development Program over the past three years to support Council initiatives aligned with the agreed CCC priority areas.

8 CCC Forum

- 8.1 The Act stipulates that the CCC must convene a forum drawn from members of the City of Adelaide community and seek advice from, or share information with, the members of the forum.
- 8.2 A CCC Forum on 'Adaptive Re-use' was proposed by the Lord Mayor and was held on 5 May 2023 in the Adelaide Town Hall. It explored the willingness of key industry leaders to explore and utilise assets to generate housing (including affordable housing) to assist in revitalising the city.

2021-22 ANNUAL REPORT for the Capital City Committee

This annual report is to be presented to Parliament and the City of Adelaide to meet the statutory reporting requirements of the *City of Adelaide Act 1998 (Part 2 – Collaborative arrangements for the strategic development of the City of Adelaide)*.

While not strictly deemed to be a Government agency or entity, the Capital City Committee is an intergovernmental body established by and reporting to the Parliament of South Australia. As a result, the broad requirements of the Premier and Cabinet Circular PC013 Annual Reporting have been adopted in the preparation of this report.

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Overview: About the Capital City Committee

Purpose

Established by the Government of South Australia under the *City of Adelaide Act, 1998* (the Act), the Capital City Committee is an intergovernmental body of the Government and City of Adelaide with a legislated mandate to enhance and promote the development of the City of Adelaide as the capital city of the State.

Objectives

- Identify and promote key strategic requirements for the economic, social, physical and environmental development and growth of the City of Adelaide as the primary focus for the cultural, educational, tourism, retail and commercial activities of South Australia.
- Promote and assist in the maximisation of opportunities for the effective coordination of public and private resources to meet the key strategic requirements identified by the Committee, and recommend priorities for joint action by the State Government and the City of Adelaide.
- Monitor the implementation of programs designed to promote the development of the City of Adelaide.
- Make provision for the publication of key strategies, goals and commitments relevant to the development and growth of the City of Adelaide.
- Collect, analyse and disseminate information about the economic, social, physical and environmental development of the City of Adelaide, with particular emphasis on assessing outcomes and identifying factors that will encourage or facilitate future development within the City of Adelaide.

Committee Operations

The Committee met three times over the reporting year (September, November and June) and is supported by an Executive Group of senior officials from the Government and the City of Adelaide.

Both the Committee and the Executive Group are supported by staff situated within the Department of the Premier and Cabinet. The Committee's activities and administration are jointly and equally funded by the Government of South Australia and the City of Adelaide.

Legislation administered by the agency

The Capital City Committee administers no legislation.

Other related agencies

As a strategic intergovernmental body bringing together the Government of South Australia and the City of Adelaide, key partners and agencies related to the Committee for 2021-22 include:

- **Department of the Premier and Cabinet (DPC):** The Premier chairs the Committee and the Deputy Chief Executive of DPC is a member of the Committee's Executive Group. The Department also hosts the secretariat and strategic project coordination and support, and contributes half of the funding for the program.
- **City of Adelaide:** Represented on the Committee by the Lord Mayor and Council Members, and on the Executive Group by the Chief Executive Officer and the Managing Director, Adelaide Economic Development Agency. The City of Adelaide provides half of the funding for the program.
- **Attorney General's Department (1 July 2021 – 19 March 2022):** Minister for Planning and Local Government and Chief Executive of the Attorney General's Department represented on the Committee and Executive Group respectively.
- **Department for Trade and Investment (DTI):** Minister for Planning and Chief Executive of DTI represented on the Committee and Executive Group respectively.

- **South Australian Tourism Commission (SATC):** Minister for Tourism and Chief Executive of SATC represented on the Committee and Executive Group respectively.
- **Department for Infrastructure and Transport (1 July 2021 – 19 March 2022):** Chief Executive represented on the Executive Group.
- **Renewal SA:** Chief Executive represented on the Executive Group.

Acknowledgements

The Capital City Committee extends its sincere gratitude to all who have contributed towards the implementation of initiatives throughout the reporting period. Employees of the State Government and the City of Adelaide have underpinned the work of the Committee.

In addition, staff and volunteers who have contributed to the growth and development of Adelaide's diverse strengths are also acknowledged and appreciated.

The Committee's Development Program Priorities

The Capital City Committee is required by legislation to develop, endorse and review an annual Capital City Development Program.

Ensuring the health, safety and wellbeing of our City community in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic was paramount during this period.

The City of Adelaide and the Government of South Australia worked in partnership to prioritise funding and deliver innovative solutions to support city traders and to encourage workers and visitors to return to the City. These included Mainstreet and Laneways Revitalisation Grants, Outdoor Activation Grants, Events and Festivals Sponsorship funding, new road closures, additional pop-up spaces, curated outdoor dining experiences, crowd control measures and free public transport. These initiatives ensured a COVID-safe festival season that set a global standard for festival and event delivery during a pandemic, saw city streets buzzing with people, boosting Adelaide's night time economy, and enhancing its global reputation as a 'magnet city' and UNESCO City of Music.

The Capital City Committee's Development Program provided vital support for a range of activation projects to boost vibrancy and attract people back into the city following the COVID-19 restrictions.

City Experience

CreaTech City Challenge

A collaboration between the then Department for Innovation and Skills and the City of Adelaide, the CreaTech City Challenge was developed as an innovation challenge that sought to Reignite Adelaide and accelerate South Australia's emerging CreaTech capabilities by building collaborations between businesses, artists and researchers; developing new South Australian intellectual property; and gamifying new and interesting experiences.

A total of 42 applications were submitted of which nine were shortlisted to the pitch development stage. Three successful applicants were selected for funding including, Dave Court, James Brown and Australian Institute of Machine Learning; Butterfly Conservation SA; and Sandpit Media Pty Ltd, with concepts to be fully developed and delivered in the city or North Adelaide by January 2023.

The Capital City Committee provided \$300,000 towards the project.

Mainstreet & Laneway Revitalisation and Improvement Grants

The Capital City Committee committed \$400,000 in funding for two rounds of grants with a focus on mainstreets and surrounding laneways. This built upon a previous successful partnership between the City of Adelaide and the Government of South Australia in April 2021, which saw \$200,000 invested in a grant scheme to revitalise and enhance street frontages on main streets.

Small businesses, organisations and property owners along the main streets and laneways in the city and North Adelaide were encouraged to apply for funding to activate and improve their exteriors, outdoor areas and overall street amenity to attract visitors and customers.

Administered by the City of Adelaide, Round One of the scheme opened from 1 – 28 February 2022 and was oversubscribed with 99 applications with the total pool of funding requested exceeding \$800,000.

A total of 25 businesses received grants ranging from \$2,000 to a maximum of \$10,000 with applicants contributing at least 20% of the total costs of the proposed improvements. Successful applicants used the grant funding for a variety of purposes including the purchase of outdoor furniture, signage, greenery, painting and window treatments.

Due to the significant demand for these grants, the opening of Round Two of the scheme was brought forward to June 2022 with \$200,000 in funding available. Fifty-nine applications were received with nearly \$255,000 in funding requested.

Friday Night Live

The Friday Night Live grant programme provided an opportunity for eligible musicians to maintain a strong live music presence in the City and North Adelaide, providing reasons for people to return to the city and to support local businesses to recover from the impact of COVID-19 restrictions.

Friday Night Live was co-funded by the City of Adelaide and the Capital City Committee with each contributing \$45,000 towards the initiative. In January 2022, Council approved a further \$90k for the Friday Night Live program as part of the Reignite 2.0 initiatives.

The total programme funding of \$180,000 delivered direct incentives to businesses to seed fund programs of live music in their venues, as well as marketing including 'Friday Night Live Venue' window stickers for venues and an event photographer.

Over 40 venues were funded to operate Friday Night Live events, with grants contributing towards artist fees, the purchase of sound or lighting equipment to facilitate live music performances at the venue or dedicated sound and lighting technician costs.

Event Infrastructure (Bollards) in the East End

The Government of South Australia together with the City of Adelaide invested \$300,000 for the installation of retractable and drop in bollards to enable efficient street closures in the East End during the February/March 2022 festival period. The initiative was designed to reduce costs, remove red tape, and improve safety for event organisers, local retailers and hospitality venues. The installation enabled street closures of Rundle Street, Frome Street, Ebenezer Place, Vardon Avenue and East Terrace, creating a festival atmosphere and outdoor dining opportunities onto streets and footpaths.

Event Infrastructure Incentives Scheme

The Event Infrastructure Incentives Scheme, funded initially through the City of Adelaide, provided further assistance to the event sector and to support local businesses that supply the infrastructure required to operate events and festivals in the City of Adelaide. Funds were used to offset costs such as generator and fencing hire, site huts, toilets and other related infrastructure costs.

The Capital City Committee provided an additional \$50,000 towards a third round of incentives in 2021-22. The scheme was oversubscribed with 17 applications and a total funding request of over \$147,000. The seven successful recipients received up to \$10,000 towards events occurring from 1 January 2022 to 30 June 2022.

Events supported include Sanaa Street Festival, Wildlife Photographer of the Year, Fork Yeah it's Friday, Celebrating Culture – Adelaide Fringe RAP Launch, MACRO: Adelaide Festival Free Opening Event, Nature Day, and Gathered Markets.

City Plan

The Capital City Committee allocated a total of \$200,000 (\$100,000 of which relates to the 2020-21 financial year) towards the development of this initiative to guide future growth and development of the heart of metropolitan Adelaide.

The 30-Year Plan for Greater Adelaide provides a sound framework for strategising the City's future within the context of metropolitan Adelaide and the State, however, is not positioned or able to provide the fine-grain on-ground responses to address the truly unique characteristics of the City of Adelaide. A dedicated City Plan offers the best approach to guiding future growth and development of the heart of metropolitan Adelaide.

City Residential Growth

Population growth in the City of Adelaide has been a key focus of the Council and discussed on numerous occasions by the Capital City Committee. While the rate of population growth in the City of Adelaide has outstripped that of South Australia over the past two decades, significant issues remain in accelerating and sustaining this growth.

The Government of South Australia and City of Adelaide including the Adelaide Economic Development Agency worked together to address the variety of issues

associated with residential growth in the city.

During 2021-22, the City of Adelaide endorsed a residential housing and growth action plan, and commenced construction on city shaping projects including 88 O'Connell Street and Market Square.

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Financial Performance

Financial Performance at a Glance

Under the *City of Adelaide Act 1998* administrative and staffing costs of the Capital City Committee must be shared equally between the State and the City of Adelaide.

In 2021-22 contributions from both parties to the Committee totalled \$681,000.
