

Examples of Successful Grant Applications

In addition to meeting Community Impact Grants strategic objectives and priorities, applications demonstrating one or more of the following attributes are more likely to score higher in assessment:

- One or more additional partners are involved in the development and delivery of the initiative evidenced by a supporting letter from partners
- The applicant is contributing some of their own funds/in-kind contribution to the project which is clearly demonstrated in the budget
- The initiative has been co-designed with direct input from the beneficiaries/target group of the project
- The initiative has been developed based on the learnings from previous, similar projects and/or based on documented evidence/research
- There are clear plans and processes in place to evaluate the impact of the initiative

Examples of successful applications across Quick Response, Community Impact Grants and Community Infrastructure Grants are provided below with some reasoning as to why they were successful in receiving full or part funding.

Quick Response Grants

Applicant	Gowrie SA

Strategic Objective Identified	Reconciliation
Brief Description	An evening celebrating culture, including a welcome to Country and traditional singing, dancing and exploration of Kaurna and Torres Strait Islander cultures. An opportunity for City of Adelaide residents and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community to come together to listen to acoustic performances and dancers from Torres Strait Islander, Kaurna, and African community on the lawns of Whitmore Square. Free, public community event, open to the wider public, as part of the Adelaide Fringe.
Why was this application successful?	 Evidenced additional partner support including funding. It was an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander led initiative aligned to Council's Reconciliation Action Plan and Strategic Plan. Attendance was free of charge, and it provided a wonderful opportunity for the local resident community to come together with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. The application clearly identified what Council funds would be used for within the budget.

Strategic Objective Identified	Participation
Brief Description	Two workshops held at the Uni Lodge for young people (16-30 years), on sustainable eating. Focusing on cheap, tasty, plant-based meals that are positive for the environment and human health and understanding their Foodprint, enabling participants to make changes.
Why was this application successful?	 Targeted young people living in the City, with a focus on international students. Clear evidence of partnerships to support delivery. Process in place to measure the knowledge growth of participants. Identified what Council funds would be used for within the budget.

Project Name	Festival of Flowers
Applicant	Adelaide Telangana Association

Strategic Objective Identified	Neighbourhood Connection
Brief Description	Festival of Flowers is a community event organised by Adelaide Telangana Association Inc. It's a South Indian Telangana State festival which celebrates women and girls. It is free to the general public offering diverse cultural activities and experiences, with all members of the community welcome.
Why was this application successful?	 A well organised community level multi-cultural event taking place in a prominent event space within the city. Strong focus on celebrating women and girls. Free event open to wider community that aims to include other cultures not just Telangana. Additional funds secured to support delivery.



Project Name	Game for all - Community Cricket
Applicant	Telugu Association of South Australia Incorporated
Amount Requested	\$2,000

Strategic Objective Identified	Social Inclusion
Brief Description	Community T20 Cricket Tournament - Telugu Association of South Australia brings together all community members who were playing for different cricket clubs during summer together for a winter cricket competition with new migrants and international students. The competition runs On Saturdays between April and June in Victoria Park with around 8 teams participating.
Why was this application successful?	 Good social connection project that allows participants to develop and expand their social networks whilst participating in physical activity. Clear budget with additional sponsorship and player registration fee structure to cover the delivery costs. Supports activation of Victoria Park during winter.

Project Name	Manage and grow learn to fence programs under COVID restrictions
Applicant	Adelaide Swords Club Inc
Amount Requested	\$2,000
Amount Received	\$2,000
Strategic Objective Identified	Social Inclusion
Brief Description	Assist Adelaide Swords Club to meet increased demand for adult and kids learn to fence programs during a period of increase hire costs and cleaning requirements to ensure the programs are COVID Safe. Additional masks and uniforms are needed to ensure equipment isn't shared during sessions. Delivery of two five week children's taster sessions and four, two hour adult taster sessions at North Adelaide Primary School.
Why was this application successful?	 Clearly identified a need for the project which was to support continued delivery and participation during restrictions without additional costs being passed on to participants. Offering 30% discount to city residents. Clear what Council funds would be used for and a financial contribution from the applicant.

Why was this application successful?	 High level of detail in the application. Itemised budget, clearly identifying what council funds will contribute towards. Innovative concept with clear, measurable outcomes and a commitment to an evaluation report. Focus on delivering in the Park Lands over a 10-month period

Brief Description	Delivering vital water safety education to the CALD community within the City of Adelaide, in partnership with Adelaide Aquatic Centre and Australian Migrant Resource Centre. This project aimed to provide accessible programs to participants whilst increasing social connections.
Why was this application successful? 	- Preparation of the Pongal Dish which is then shared by the community marking the festival.
	- Traditional rice-powder based Kolam artworks are staged by various teams of family and friends.
	- Traditional Pongal games such as "kabadi", "uriyadi", meaning hitting the suspended pot", and "Tug of war"
	- Children's entertainment
	- Traditional activities such as pot making and pot painting for kids and adults.
	- Food stalls and stalls including Tamil Arts and culture.
	- Traditional performances including singing and dancing.

Why was this application successful? Brief Description	Upgrade and improve the accessibility and facilities of the community drop in centre in order to meet the needs of isolated and marginalised groups and create an inclusive community space where individuals have the opportunity to connect and participate in activities. Funds to contribute to installation of automatic doors and renovation of the existing toilet block to make it wheelchair accessible.
Why was this application successful?	 High level of detail provided with clear outcomes Good evidence of need for the project with supporting evidence The Drop in Care Space is still in its infancy with a vision to establish a community drop-in centre that is accessible and welcoming to everyone aged 18+ The organisation already has a good level of community support evidenced by a successful GoFundMe campaign attracting 74



donations totalling more than \$10,000 to secure tenure of the building.
Providing easy access for people with a disability is a necessary
component for this organisation to create a welcoming and inclusive
space and aligns with Council's Strategic Plan and Disability
Access and Inclusion Plan.

Project Name	Permeable Fence to Community Garden Perimeter
Applicant	Park Terrace Community Garden Incorporated

Brief Description	Constructing a 1.5m high permeable fence of 70mm split wattle pales wired with 100mm spacings sitting on a 50 mm H4 plinth of treated pine and tensioned between appropriate posts around the community garden located in Mary Lee Park. The total length will be 115 metres and make provision for 2 accessible gates. The fence will be a permeable living barrier that allows views into the garden and provides the community with a safe place to escape the rigours of urban life.
Why was this application successful?	 Clearly identified need for the project Already sought in principle approval from Council and consulted the Adelaide Park Lands Authority Potential to attract new members with increased safety Clear budget with breakdown of each phase of construction with supporting quotes

Project Name	Tee Pads
Applicant	South Australian Disc Golf
Amount Requested	\$48,783
Amount Received	\$48,783
Strategic Objective Identified	Participation
Brief Description	Installation of tee pads. Due to popularity of the Disc Golf Course in King Rodney Park, the tee off sections of natural grass have been torn up from consistent use from SA Disc golf but even more so by the public. These have created unsteady ground to throw from. Working with the council's agriculture team, they have found a product called Soilbond which is commonly used around the city for pathways and temporary driveways. This product will be used for all nine tee pads.



Why was this application successful?

- The disc golf course is easily accessible to the public, can be used casually at no cost and is a popular activity in the Park Lands
- The sport of disc golf continues to grow in popularity and is a lowcost, socially inclusive sport
- The disc golf course plays a key role in activation of the Park Lands, addresses many barriers to participation in physical activity and aligns with a number of Strategic Plan outcomes
- The construction of the tee pads will improve both the safety and quality of the course for the community and ensure that this important asset maintains excellent condition for many years to come
- Sa Disc Golf liaised with Council prior to application to seek approval for the project
- Clear need identified for the project
