THE MUSEUM OF ECONOMIC BOTANY

Botanic Gardens, off North Terrace

In the mid 1870s Dr Schomburghk announced the necessity of a new building for the existing herbarium and economic collection. The collection which was stowed away in a 'little room in the backyard' was being slowly destroyed by damp and white ant.

Grants were sanctioned by parliament in 1877-79. Plans were drawn up by colonial architectin-chief E.J. Woods for a new museum '... in the Greek style and the first of its kind in South Australia'. It was erected under Woods' supervision and built by James Anderson. The chief glory of this building is its finely decorated ceiling, which was painted in a Greek design by W.J. Williams. The overall design of the museum was reviewed by Schomburghk as 'chaste and tasteful'.

Built of random masonry and then rendered in thick cement to imitate ashlar, the museum has little decoration to its front. There is a rolled metal truncated-hip roof with cast-iron lacework along the ridge.

The museum helps establish the physical character of the Botanic Gardens and is located centrally in the gardens looking out over a large open lawn planted with conifers.

The building - which remains almost unchanged in form and function - is of architectural and historical importance. It was part of a major expansion program set up by Dr Schomburghk during his time as director, 1865-91, and reflects the high regard for scientific and educational displays and institutions held during that Victorian era.


